The Poultry Industry is an Integral Part of the Economy in South Carolina

- ❖ The poultry and egg industry in South Carolina employs as many as 11,977 people across the state and generates an additional 25,497 jobs in supplier and ancillary industries. These include jobs in companies supplying goods and services to the industry.
- ❖ These are good jobs paying an average of \$56,100 in wages and benefits. And in today's economy, every job is important. In fact, in South Carolina the unemployment rate has reached 4.3 percent. This means that there are 107,900 people trying to find jobs across the state.

The Economic Benefits of the Industry Spread Throughout the State

- ❖ Not only does the poultry and egg industry create good jobs in South Carolina but the industry also contributes to the economy as a whole. The broader economic impact flows throughout the economy, generating business for firms seemingly unrelated to the poultry and egg industry. Real people, with real jobs, working in industries as varied as banking, real estate, accounting, even printing all depend on the poultry and egg industry for their livelihood.
- ❖ In fact, in 2024, the industry was responsible for as much as \$10.83 billion in total economic activity throughout the state, creating or supporting as many as 37,474 total jobs.
- ❖ Not only does the poultry and egg industry create jobs, it also generates sizeable tax revenues. In South Carolina, the industry and its employees pay about \$539.49 million in federal taxes, and \$379.37 million in state and local taxes.
